

A Guide to the Morning Service

The Psalms, Hymns, and Spiritual Songs

The King of Love My Shepherd Is

Our opening hymn this Lord's Day Morning is actually a beautiful paraphrase of the beloved Twenty-Third Psalm. Henry Baker, editor-in-chief of Hymns Ancient and Modern, wrote this text based on Psalm 23, and it appeared in the appendix of that hymnal in 1868. The six stanzas of this hymn correlate closely to the six verses of Psalm 23, while drawing connections between this well-known Old Testament passage and several New Testament images, all on the theme of the Good Shepherd. In the first two stanzas, the connections are subtle. In stanza 1, Baker adds a comment on the two-way, eternal nature of the relationship between the shepherd and the sheep, referring to Jesus' words in John 10:28. By changing the words "still waters" to "streams" of living water," Baker recalls Jesus' declaration that He is the source of these streams (John 4:14, 7:37-39). Stanza 3 clearly refers to the Parable of the Lost Sheep (Luke 15:3-7). In the second half of the hymn, the connection between Old and New Testaments is more pronounced by the use of the words "cross" (st. 4), "chalice" (st. 5, referring to the cup in the Lord's Supper), and "Good Shepherd" (st. 6). A Psalm brimming with the truth of our God's kingly shepherding over our souls and lives, let us then sing it light of the joy and refreshing confidence that it surely imparts!

What can one say to do justice to this great hymn of Reginald Heber, and to the magnificent tune "Nicea" by John Dykes? Albert E. Bailey opines: "No hymn has greater dignity and uplifting power." The lyric gives us a succession of staccato assertions about the Triune God. He is "Lord God Almighty," thrice holy, "Merciful and mighty," adored, worshiped, eternal, unequaled, "perfect in power, in love, and purity." The whole shape of the hymn is Trinitarian, that is, it serves to accent the unique Christian doctrine of the Trinity—God is one God it serves to accent the unique Christian doctrine of the Trinity—God is one God who eternally exists in three persons. This is one of our favorite hymns, and a magnificent one to sing during our Lord's Day Morning Worship.

I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord

Following our hearing God's Word proclaimed and our study of the Scriptures, we sing this familiar and beloved hymn. Written by the famous Timothy Dwight, for many years President of Yale, this is thought to be the oldest hymn still in common use written by an American. Dwight actually wrote the lyrics to this hymn as a paraphrase of the themes of Psalm 137. Its theme, the kingdom of God, fits well with the theme of Philippians 4—the joy of the fellowship of the people of God and the extension and triumph of God's Kingdom as Christ's saving message is spread throughout all the earth. Set to the triumphant tune "St. Thomas", this is a glorious way for us to respond to God's Word and to conclude our Lord's Day Morning Worship together!
