Key Thought: Growth of Church

Key Verse: 2:47

<u>Time</u>: This book covers approximately 31 years -30 AD to 61 AD. This was time from the ascension of Christ until Paul was a prisoner in Rome.

Author: Luke (refer to notes on gospel of Luke)

Object:

- 1. The gospels show what Christ began to do in the way of teaching and works. The Acts show the continuation of this teaching and work from heaven instead of earth; through the church instead of personally.
- 2. Divinely inspired church history showing the origin, guidance and spread of the Christian church through the instrumentality of men, chiefly Peter and Paul.
- 3. It shows the true method and nature of successful preaching; the secret of power in all Christian service, and the divine procedure in the establishing of Christian churches.
