A GUIDE TO THE MORNING SERVICE

The Psalms in Worship

The Bible is our roadmap to reality. And if the Bible is truly the Word of God [and it is], this statement is not only true for the Christian, but for every single person on the earth. While our first parents in Eden had no need of a written Bible (since God always spoke directly to them), they nevertheless stood in need of His Word to them. Even before one page of sacred Scripture was ever penned, human beings were still dependent on the Word of God to understand who they were, what their purpose was, and how they were to fulfill that purpose (Gen. 1:26-31). But God's Word not only articulates what we should believe and do, but it also illuminates for us the full range of human emotional life and experience in a fallen world. Many passages could be referenced, but it is specifically in the Psalms where we find displayed a model for emotions. This is one of the many reasons why we intentionally choose to sing various settings of Psalms in our worship services at First Presbyterian Church.

The Psalms Train our Hearts

In our modern western culture we are often taught that emotions are dangerous and are better left unengaged. This is not the Bible's view of a healthy, emotional life. And thoroughly Biblical worship should never be emotionless and cold, but instead should produce people who are trained by the Scriptures to think and feel in ways that most honor the Lord. When this happens, we are able to experience freedom and liberation in the truest sense. Singing Psalms each Lord's Day is an aspect of this kind of training where our emotions and affections are being stirred anew and fixed upon the one who made them for His glory. This is what led St. Ambrose of Milan, in the 4th Century A.D., to describe the Psalms as "a gymnasium for the soul" when they are used as the church's prayers and songs. Whether we are singing about our souls being cast down to a place where "darkness is our only companion" (Ps. 88), or about our hearts being so glad that our "whole being rejoices" (Ps.16), the Psalms teach us what to do with our emotions and they urge us to bring them before the Lord in worship. Old Testament commentator, Derek Kidner, says "the Psalms have among other roles in Scripture one which is peculiarly their own: to touch and kindle us rather than simply to address us."

The Bible urges us in Ephesians 5:19 to make melody with our hearts through the use of "psalms, hymns and spiritual songs." According to this verse, this is not only a good strategy for us as individuals, but it is also a way to encourage our brothers and sisters in the faith. This is what we desire to do in our worship services each Lord's Day morning and evening. We seek to use all of the rich resources that God has given us to train our emotions and affections to be redirected from the idols that always enslave, to the God who always offers true freedom. May we sense God's freedom this morning as we use the singing of Psalms to give Him glory!
