## A Guide to the Morning Service

## The Scripture Reading

## Nehemiah 7:5-56 Life returns to normal

Chapter 7 draws a boundary around the narrative of the building of the wall of Jerusalem. As we read about the stipulations that Nehemiah sets up in connection with guarding the gates of the completed wall, it dawns on us that never has there been a more famous wall in the history of the world than this storied wall of the rebuilt Jerusalem. The bulk of the chapter is devoted to lists of names and tabulation of numbers of those who returned to Jerusalem from exile in Babylon. As the lists keep expanding, we begin to get caught up in the excitement and magnitude of the event. At the end of the chapter we catch hints of a story with the description of what the leaders and populace gave to the building project, along with a summary of the influential professional groups that enabled the nation once again to live in their towns. A strong sense of community cooperation emerges, giving us a picture of what it takes to build the city of God. (Literary Study Bible, Crossway)

## The Psalms, Hymns, and Spiritual Songs

## Hallelujah, Praise Jehovah, O My Soul (Psalm 146)

We begin our worship together this Lord's Day Morning by singing this familiar and beautiful psalm-paraphrase. The text of this song comes from the Psalter of 1912 and is a metrical version of Psalm 146. The tune, "Ripley," is familiar to us (we sing "Lord, with Glowing Heart I'd Praise Thee" to it) and was a Gregorian Chant melody arranged by the great Lowell Mason. Mason was interested in music from childhood. He lived in Savannah, Georgia, for 15 years, worked as a bank clerk, and wrote his music on the side. His first musical collection was finally accepted in 1822 by the Handel and Haydn Society of Boston, Massachusetts (his native state), and went through 17 editions, selling 50,000 copies. It was adopted by singing schools in New England, and eventually church choirs. Mason eventually served as the director of music at the Hanover, Green, Park, and Bowdoin Street churches (all the while holding on to his job as teller at the American Bank!). In Boston, Mason became the first music teacher in an American public school. In 1833, he co-founded the Boston Academy of Music; in 1838, he became music superintendent for the Boston school system. Lowell Mason wrote over 1,600 religious works, and is often called the "father of American church music."

## The Doxology

Immediately following our Prayer of Adoration and Confession, we continue our Morning Worship by singing this familiar stanza of praise, "the Doxology." It is a call for everyone in heaven and earth to praise the Triune God who is the giver of all blessings. Incidentally, this familiar text is merely the last stanza of each of three hymns composed by the fine evangelical Bishop Thomas Ken in 1674 ("All Praise to Thee My God This Night"; "Awake, My Soul and With the Sun"; and "Lord, Now My Sleep Doth Me Forsake"). "Doxology" simply means "word of praise," in reference to a brief ascription of adoration to God. Today, we sing to the tune Lasst Uns Erfreuen (to which we sing "All Creatures of Our God and King).
