SPIRITUAL HOMESICKNESS

Checking out at the grocery store has curiously embarrassing become а experience for me ever since moving, some twelve years ago, to Mississippi. A typical encounter goes like this. Shortly after repeating something, really anything, to the uncomprehending cashier. I am instantly and invariably interrogated: "Where y'all frawm?" On one occasion, which lingers now in my memory like a childhood trauma, the cashier called over to the person bagging the groceries nearby to inform her in awed tones that I was from Scotland. This news was greeted with as much wonder as if she had said I was from Jupiter. The 'bagger' then raised her voice, and shouted across the store to her colleagues that I was from Scotland and that they should come at once. Now with a small crowd blocking my exit, she turned on me once again and, like Peter speaking for the disciples, pressed on me the desire of the whole group: "Say sut'm!" Once I had deciphered what she was saying. I blushed furiously. "How embarrassing!" I mumbled. Apparently, nothing produced grins and exclamations of wonder in a Mississippi grocery store quite like a naturally rolled rrr." I fled.

Situations like these remind me that. however comfortable I have come to be in my adopted country, I remain a stranger in a strange land. In fact, they often leave me in a reverie, remembering my hometown. A gritty, former ship building city, historically Glasgow was "the second city of the Empire." Today, it is a bustling, cosmopolitan place. Lacking the scenic beauties of its rival. Edinburgh, the Glasgow of my youth always felt just a little dangerous. Riven by deep sectarian division, the Roman Catholic and Protestant populations rarely mixed and often clashed. Hard looking working men staggered, drunk, from the pubs onto the black streets shiny from the rain to yell incoherently at flocks of grimy pigeons or the double-decker buses as they rumbled past. Gangs of foul-mouthed youths loitered on street corners like hyenas looking for opportune prey. I always found waiting for a bus home at night in Glasgow city center a slightly scary enterprise.

But my Glasgow was also a place of discovery. There, my parents fostered artistic sensibilities. There, I came to faith in Christ while a student at Bannerman High School. And there I was discipled in the loving embrace of Carmyle Parish Church, a small, mainline Presbyterian congregation whose evangelical pastor mentored and encouraged me ceaselessly. Its membership was at that time overwhelmingly elderly and female, yet there I learned the value of Christian fellowship. There I watched my minister exemplify the kind of pastoral diligence to which I continue to aspire today. Sitting under the preaching of Eric Alexander at St George's Tron in the city center, I came to harbor a deep love for the exposition of God's Word. For good and for ill, my deepest programming was put in place in Glasgow, and so it will always hold a place in my heart.

But I've had to learn what is familiar to any who've moved away from home: you can never really go back. The Glasgow of my youth doesn't exist anymore. The streets don't look the same. Attitudes have changed, albeit many for the better. It is always good to visit, of course. But when I go back, I am filled with gratitude that I live here and not there. Funny how our hearts long for home, but not while we are living in it! When I'm here, I think often of Scotland. When I'm in Scotland, I long to be back in Mississippi.

But then, perhaps that is part of the divine design. We are all hard wired for Home. just not the home we are living in now, for, as Hebrews 13:14 puts it, "here we have no continuing city." In the words of St. Augustine's famous prayer, "our hearts are restless 'till they find their rest" only in God. In these days of pandemic, when nothing is as it should be, I hope we've become more open to a pilgrim life. I hope that our attachment to home-here has been loosened, at least a little. For, in the gospel, we are being called to long for homehereafter. May God awaken in us a kind of spiritual homesickness that pushes us all back to Christ. He is, after all, our only way Home!

• In God's providence, babies keep coming. We've had two placements since we have been on work-from-home status which is more challenging for us. Pregnancy counselors are not allowed to be with birthmoms during delivery so that's is hard on both of them.

• Babies go from hospital, to one of our interim care families, then to their adoptive families, in a matter of a few days. Everyone is clean and careful, but that is a lot of exposure for a brand new baby.

• We are seeing a downturn in giving since this virus situation got more serious. Pray that those will all be restored when things get normal again or that God will raise up new sources of support in this period.

Resuming In-Person Worship Services

We are very glad to announce that we will worship in person again beginning June 7, 2020. We have missed being together and are glad to get the chance to see one another face to face. As everyone likely anticipates, things will be different for now. We have received the governor's reopening guidelines, consulted with doctors, and spoken with other churches. With all this in mind, we have created the following plan for resuming worship services in person at First Presbyterian Church. We've organized this information around some frequently asked questions, but if you have any other questions or concerns, please feel free to contact us at the church office at 601-353-8316 or receptionist@fpcjackson.org, and we will direct you to the appropriate staff member.

Should I stay home?

We want to assure anyone who might feel safer staying home and worshiping via livestream that you should feel no guilt or shame in doing so.

If you have any of the following symptoms, please do not attend: fever, chills, body aches, cough/congestion, recent loss of taste or smell, or if you are generally unwell. Based on current medical advice, we strongly encourage those who are in categories of increased risk of hospitalization from COVID-19 due to underlying health issues, low immunity, or age, also to consider refraining from attending worship services right now.

What will Sundays look like in general?

- Worship will remain at normal times: 8:30 a.m., 11:00 a.m., and 6:00 p.m.
- We will resume worship services only. There will be no meetings of Sunday School classes on Sundays.
- There will be no nursery available. All children are very welcome in the worship services.
- There will be no choir. For now, music will be led by small groups or soloists.
- Based on the latest medical advice, we discourage corporate congregational singing during the services at this time. The words of the hymns will be provided, so that you can follow along as they are sung from the platform. This isn't ideal, and we hope to change it soon, but we are trying to follow best practices for the good of all, and we ask for your patience and understanding.
- We will continue to stream our services online. We also broadcast the service from the week prior at 10:00 a.m. on WLBT.

What about the details?

In order to resume, we will need to follow a number of guidelines to keep everyone as safe as possible, including the following:

- From the parking lot to the pew, we ask that everyone practice social distancing.
- We will be limiting capacity at each service. We ask that all congregants sign up in order to attend the service.
- To avoid bottlenecks at the entrances, we'd ask that you please arrive 15-20 minutes early.
- The ushers will be available to help everyone find a responsibly-distanced seat.

This may not be your "usual" seat. We'd ask that you follow the ushers' directions while we work to keep everyone safe. People who live in the same home can and should sit together.

• After the service is over, please remain in your seats, and the ushers will help dismiss everyone in sections.

How do I sign up?

During this phase of reopening, we will need everyone to register for worship services. It is a sad consequence of our situation that we will have a limited number of spots for each service in order to accommodate appropriate social distancing. Here are the details:

What are we doing to keep everyone safe?

Here are a few other best practices that we will implement:

- Everyone should wear a face mask throughout the service. We will have some available, but we recommend you bring your own.
- The sanctuary will be sanitized following each service.
- Bathrooms will be available for use in the Greeting Courtyard and between the Sanctuary and the Library and will also be cleaned between services.
- We ask that no one drink from the drinking fountains.
- Hand sanitizer will be available.
- We will have bulletins placed on seats waiting for your arrival. Please take them with you when you leave.
- Instead of passing offering plates, our ushers will be standing by the doors in the sanctuary to collect your tithes and offerings at the close of each service.
 Online giving is also available through our website and our church app.

Resuming Ministry Activities
