CAROL BACKGROUND INFORMATION

"Hark! The Herald Angels Sing"

One of Wesley's great hymns, the tune is from Mendelssohn (his cantata *Festgesang*). This carol is full of biblical and theological allusions.

"O Come, All Ye Faithful"

One hymnologist says this of Wade's carol, "Its popularity in all English-speaking countries is universal: hardly a congregation fails to sing it at every Christmas time. Such popularity is testimony to its genuine worth."

"Away in a Manger"

Leonard Payton says this song "conveys the plainness of Jesus' humanity probably more directly than any other hymn"— though some have complained of implicit docetism in the second stanza's claim that "no crying he makes."

"Come, Thou Long-Expected Jesus"

This hymn is one of Charles Wesley's masterpieces of hymnody. It ponders the richness of revelation found in the prophecies of the Old Testament and plumbs the depths of the reality of the second member of the Triune God becoming man: "Born Thy people to deliver, born a child and yet a king, born to reign in us forever, now Thy gracious kingdom bring."

"Silent Night! Holy Night!"

This carol has been a favorite of Christians worldwide for almost 200 years. Joseph Mohr's lyrics capture a sense of hushed reverence at the birth of the Saviour.

"Angels, from the Realms of Glory"

James Montgomery, a great evangelical hymn-writer whose works are still widely sung in Britain, wrote these lyrics and published them in a newspaper in Sheffield, England, on Christmas Eve, 1816.

"O Little Town of Bethlehem"

The author of this favorite carol of Christmastide was Phillips Brooks, the famous Episcopal clergyman, still associated with Holy Trinity Church in Boston's Back Bay area. In the first three stanzas, Brooks piles up objective truths about the incarnation. Brooks uses the physical darkness of night to represent the spiritual darkness of the world and draws a parallel between the silent entry of Jesus into the world in Bethlehem and His silent entry into meek souls who receive Him by faith. This is a great evangelical carol.

"Joy to the World!"

Based on Psalm 98, "Joy to the World" was the product of two outstanding English artists: the poet Isaac Watts and the musician George F Handel. Psalm 98 calls the whole world to celebrate the coming of the Lord. He comes both to bring justice and to assert His lordship over all of nature and all peoples.
